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## Winter Storm Information

UCSB is monitoring developments related to current storm events and potential impacts to our community members. The campus is open and classes are ongoing.

### Updates — Sunday, January 22

- Caltrans officials have announced that U.S. 101 is now open in both directions. Word came via Twitter shortly after noon: “Great news: #Hwy101 is now OPEN thru #Montecito @SBCounty! Thanks to our crews & contractors who made it happen.” Some exit ramps, however, remain closed. Details available from [CalTrans](#).

### Updates — Thursday, January 18

- The U.S. 101 Highway remains closed to northbound traffic from the Ventura/Santa Barbara County line to South Milpas Street in Santa Barbara. Up-to-date information about road conditions is available via [CalTrans](#).
- The County of Santa Barbara, in cooperation with local, state and federal emergency agencies, has opened the Local Recovery and Assistance Center for victims of the Thomas Fire and the January storm incident.

## **Updates — Monday, January 15**

## **Updates — Friday, January 12**

- CalTrans has announced it will be unable to reopen U.S. 101 between Ventura and Santa Barbara on Monday as anticipated. No new estimated date for reopening the highway was stated. Up-to-date information about road conditions is available [here](#).
- The U.S. 101 Highway remains closed to northbound traffic from the Ventura/Santa Barbara County line to South Milpas Street in Santa Barbara and is not expected to reopen until midday Monday at the earliest. Up-to-date information about road conditions is available via [CalTrans](#).

## **Updates — Thursday, January 11**

- Effective immediately and until further notice, Santa Barbara County beach ocean waters are closed due to high levels of bacterials.
- Human Resources has posted updated guidelines for implementing administrative leave pay in response to effects from the Thomas Fire, including the storm and mudslide in Montecito.
- Amtrak has resumed its Pacific Surfliner rail service through Santa Barbara County.
